AUDREY FRODSHAM - A Life well lived



We were all saddened to learn of the death on New Year's Eve of Audrey Frodsham, a loyal and hardworking member of Church Road for nearly forty years. As a tribute, here is an edited version of the words of her sister, Sylvia, on the occasion of the thanksgiving service for Audrey's life:

Audrey was born in Audenshaw, Manchester and grew up in the fellowship of Beswick Methodist Church. After leaving school, she studied at secretarial college and started work with an insurance company. Sadly, her mother suffered a stroke when Audrey was twenty and she took on the role of caring for her younger brother, Philip and sister, Sylvia, whilst still continuing to work.

Audrey married in 1956 and to start with continued to live in Manchester, later moving to Solihull and Glasgow. One of the highlights of her career was when she was appointed Personal Assistant to the office manager at British Eagle Airlines, then Britain's second largest independent airline. This enabled her to travel to many places in Europe and also to Rio de Janeiro for the Mardi Gras.

Life changed for Audrey in 1970 and in 1972 with the arrival of Simon and Edwina. In the next few years, happy and fulfilled, she devoted herself to family life. Sadly, Audrey and her husband later divorced and she moved to Lytham to be near her retired father, Sidney, then a member at Church Road. She found friendship and support in the life of Church Road and became involved in many activities, including in study groups, as a Church Steward and of course, as editor of this magazine, a position she held for over 30 years. She also worked as the receptionist at King Edward VII School, where her combination of efficiency and understanding was greatly appreciated by students and staff alike.



Audrey faced many challenges in her life, raising two teenage children on her own and experiencing much sadness in the premature death of her daughter, Edwina. Her

strong Christian faith, nurtured in her youth in the Methodist church in Beswick and celebrated here at Church Road, was a great support to her. Always positive and cheerful, an avid Manchester United supporter, Audrey simply loved life and people! Throughout, her Christian commitment was there for all to see. As a sister, mother, grandmother, great grandmother and valued friend, she reached out to so many people. Audrey's was indeed a life well lived.

A Tribute to My Dear Friend -

Many people can claim friendship with Audrey Frodsham, she was a very warm and outgoing person.

We became friendly when I arrived as a new member of Church Road thirty years ago. We went to many social and musical events and to 'singles' dances. She also joined my family for many social occasions and was regarded as one of the family.

Audrey was a truly committed Christian and lived her faith by being involved in many aspects of church life.

I never heard her utter a wrong word about anyone, she had the grace to see the good in everyone. I know that I am a better person for having known and loved her. She was a special person and will be very sadly missed.

Thank you, Audrey, for being my friend.

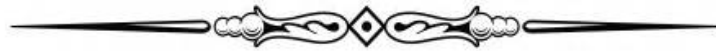
THE LAST SUPPER - LOVE ONE ANOTHER

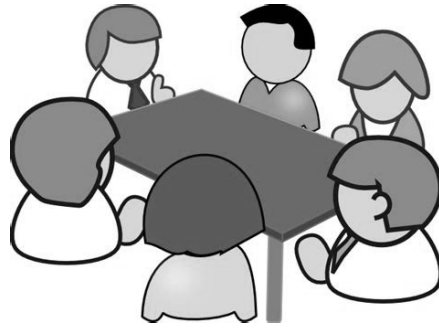

GENERAL CHURCH MEETING 2018

**Tuesday 10 April at 7.00 p.m.
followed by a meeting of the Church Council at 7.45 p.m.**

This joint meeting is open to everyone and is an opportunity for people to review what's happened in the life of the church and our plans for the future.

The formal business of the General Church Meeting is when we appoint the senior steward and the team of church stewards for the coming year. It is also when representatives are appointed to the Church Council and to the Circuit Meeting.

Nominations are invited for two church stewards and for up to six representatives to the Church Council. **Nominations should be made in writing to our Minister, Stephen, not later than the 3 April 2018.**

Nomination forms are available at the rear of the church. They can be completed by anyone who is entitled to vote. Those nominated should be members of the Methodist Church and be asked for their consent before they are formally nominated.

If you would like more information please contact Stephen or the Senior Steward Linda Butcher.

The Church Council meeting that follows will formally consider matters of current business. Everyone is welcome to make comment on the agenda items, but voting will be restricted to appointed members of the Church Council.

EUROPEAN GENERAL DATA PROTECTION REGULATION (GDPR)

On the 25 May 2018 the new European General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) becomes law and we as a church will need to comply.

This affects how we gather, store and destroy personal data. In order to comply with the law we will need to ensure we have developed a Privacy Policy and consent to hold personal information.

We do not have to have everything in place by May 2018 but we do need to be doing as much as we can to prepare for it and to ensure we have everything in place to demonstrate we are complying with it as soon as possible thereafter.

To that end we will be carrying out a mapping exercise so we know what information we hold, how it is stored and if there are any actions we need to take to meet the requirements of the law.

CIRCUIT ARRANGEMENTS FROM SEPTEMBER 2018

As many of you will already know, our Superintendent Minister, Revd Dr Adrian Burdon will be leaving the Circuit in August and unfortunately, the Circuit has been unsuccessful in securing a new Superintendent for September 2018.

The two continuing Presbyters, Stephen and Revd Sylvester Deigh, are both in the third year of their appointments and their appointments will be reviewed in the summer of 2019. In the meantime, there is money within the circuit budget for ordained staff that can be re-allocated to pay for support for lay workers.

The Circuit meeting has therefore agreed that for the period 2018-20, Rev Paul Davis, Chair of Lancashire District, will be appointed as Titular Superintendent of the South Fylde Circuit, with pastoral Charge of the six churches being allocated as follows :-

Rev Sylvester Deigh - Fairhaven, Lytham and Kirkham

Rev Stephen Heath - Church Road, Freckleton and The Drive

It is also intended that the Circuit creates two ministry teams comprising a Presbyter, Lay worker (paid part-time), Supernumerary(ies) and lay people to provide effective pastoral care and to develop mission and ministry appropriate to the local situation of each church. Each team will work together under the leadership of the Presbyter with Pastoral Charge. The detail of how this will work will be for each ministry team to decide. The lay workers will be seconded from a District Team, which has been created to cover Mission and Ministry vacancies

The incoming Superintendent Minister will continue to have overall responsibility for the Chaplaincy to Older People, and the Project Support Group will be chaired by him or his nominee. Other than this, Chaplaincy to Older People, the post currently held by Richard Golding, is not affected by the new arrangements and the funding for the project and staffing arrangements will work alongside the work of the Circuit Churches and be supported by them.

These changes will clearly affect the way in which we work as a circuit and bring additional responsibilities for Stephen and Sylvester. We pray for support and understanding for our Presbyters, Supernumeraries and Lay Workers as these new arrangements take effect.

Prior to the new arrangements taking effect in September, Revd Sylvester Deigh will be on sabbatical leave from 16 April to 16 July 2018.

Development News



Those who are able to attend church will know that we have now vacated the Church Centre and closed down the Kitchen, Parlour and Restaurant areas and we are now holding all our activities in the church.

We are very grateful to Keith Hall who, with Joan Edwell, has helped us downsize, declutter and take this big step of living on a much smaller footprint. Thank you to everyone for the time and effort made to achieve this but especially Keith who has spent many an hour measuring, recording, moving things and planning all of this.

We had expected by the time of writing to be able to say all contracts are signed and work has begun but this is not the case. We are waiting for completion of the sale of the Land which requires the agreement of The Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes. This is expected to happen any day now and then the contractors will begin to secure the site and commence the work of demolition and then the building of our new Community Hub, all due for completion in September 2018.

During the period of construction, we will only have access to the church itself and most of our organisations and activities have made plans to use this space. There will inevitably be some disruption during construction and until all the planned storage areas have been created, there will be items of equipment visibly stored in the church. Every effort will be made to minimise the impact on our worship and to screen stored items during

worship services, but please be understanding whilst the works are in progress.

We can now begin to plan for September and beyond. The foodbank and Wesley's Café will be returning when the works on the church have been completed and we look forward to a formal opening and dedication of the redeveloped premises in October. We ask that you will continue to pray for all aspects of the Development, that it may go smoothly and when completed it will create a Centre for the community where people discover the love of God in word and deed.

We will continue to update people through the weekly notices, Facebook and the website.

Looking Back

The closure of the newer Centre buildings marks a big milestone in the history of Church Road. Here John Mayes tells us about the need for bigger premises in the 1950's and the ambitious fundraising needed at that time:

As early as 1944 it had been recognised that Church Road's "post-war" problem was to be the rehousing of the Sunday School; and the Sunday School Council decided, after a very successful Anniversary in May that year, to invest £30 for a "new school". The Trustees followed their lead and the Sunday School Rebuilding Fund was opened.

In 1955 the 750,000 Pennies Scheme was launched to raise the £30,000 required to build a Sunday School extension which would include a Main Hall with stage, and Primary and Beginners' Rooms. They certainly needed the new premises as a photograph on the 1955 Anniversary shows over 200 children and young people and almost 40 teachers!

If the project was ambitious, so were the means. I can recall selling little perforated bricks from a book at sixpence each to family members and their friends and, in March 1956, going to the Parish Rooms, on my way home from school, where the three-day "Penny Bazaar" had opened. Then, on a wet St. Swithin's day that year the first sod of the development was cut by my grandfather, who had attended Sunday School at Church Road in the 1880s and was still playing an active part in Church life.

On September 1st, the foundation stones were laid by Joseph Hollas, of Lytham, a great benefactor of this Circuit, and the Minister, Rev. E.W.H. Herron and on Saturday, 29th June 1957, the new extension was opened by the Sunday School Queen, Catherine Eyre. (now one of our Church Stewards, Catherine Peak!)

Launching the fund-raising appeal of 1955-56 Ted Herron had written: "Sometimes a situation arises in which a great possibility of progress is to be discerned; but the meeting of that situation presents so many difficulties, that those who face it feel that they can do nothing about it. Not so at Church Road. With the inspiration of our faith that this is God's will for us, and with further confidence of seeing the fulfilment of our hopes within sight, let us give ourselves whole-heartedly to our task." These words are as appropriate today, as we move forward to meet the needs of our neighbourhood and community in the twenty-first century.

Changing Times

Less than 20 years after opening of the new Sunday School, fundraising started again to meet a challenging £50,000 target to build extra accommodation for a Day Care and Community Centre. This opened in 1975. Later, the premises were extended even further to meet the growing needs of the day care service.

But times moved on, changing patterns of social care demanded more professional management which led to increasing costs. Newer ways of providing care for older people in their own homes, with their own



budgets, meant declining income for traditional day care services. Sadly, the Day Care Centre closed in 2014.

Happily, new opportunities for outreach are presenting themselves and this redevelopment of our site will provide us with much improved multi-use facilities to accommodate the Foodbank and Wesley's Café, as well as space to develop projects in support of our mission to transform lives and communities. The premises will be more financially sustainable, easier to run with reduced maintenance costs. In addition, ten affordable housing units will be provided.

Thirty years ago, we celebrated our centenary and the opening of the original mission hall in 1888. It is fitting that in 2018, this historic part of our site is being retained as an integral part of our redevelopment and will continue to be central to our work at Church Road.

FINAL OPEN AFTERNOON – A time for nostalgia
